Paris – Experimental OSMOSE bus stop Public-space

The experimental Osmose bus stop on Boulevard Diderot is more than simply a place to wait for the bus. It is also a living space based around the notions of quality and comfort. It is sociable and innovative thanks to the range of services it offers. You can have a coffee, borrow books, listen to music, recharge your telephone, buy meals to take away or keep warm while eating a sandwich.

The lighting changes according to the time of day or night.

Hyères – Developing the city centre Public-space

The Sita furniture collection is organised into living rooms, which structure Avenue Clotis into a series of intimate spaces. It is possible to chat under a shady palm by a fountain, sit down to wait in front of the shops or sunbath on a comfortable seat.

At night, low level lighting (Anello light) produces a 'domestic' light to accompany these 'living room' spaces. The historic architecture bathed in gentle light provides a backdrop against which the avenue's palm trees stand.





Dubai Collection Objects

2013_

Seat designed for Bastakiya in Dubai.

Rising from the ground with no obvious legs, the curved shapes transform into pouffes, seats, arm chairs and benches.

The metal is treated as if it were material creating movement that gives the furniture its form.

A ceramic seat surface with stitched patterning balances on the metal structure. Discrete sophistication.







Bia Collection – Tôlerie Forezienne Objects

2013_

A made-to-measure seat.

The collection of independent pieces – benches, chairs, arm chairs – can be freely combined into numerous configurations. This new approach to seating moves away from pre-established design in order to better adapt to different spaces. Suitable for both interiors and exteriors, this collection can be used in diverse contexts: waiting spaces (stations, airports and hospitals), public city spaces, gardens etc.

The metal lacework on the seats gives this range a sophisticated and domestic feel.





Orkane Light – Abel _{Objets}

Invisible light.

Designed in partnership with Abel, this very innovative and functional light provides effective lighting using minimum energy.

The approach to designing this light is minimalist. The sober and elegant design provides continuous forms, a fluidly-shaped lamp, different materials and contrasting textures such as shine and matte.



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
